NOTICE of AGM

Thursday 20th March 2014

The 16th Annual General Meeting of the Friends of Carnegie Library will be held in the Gallery at Carnegie Library, 188 Herne Hill Road, London SE24 OAG on Thursday 20th March 2014. This AGM is particularly important. Pressure on budgets, and the prospect of transferring the building to the community provided sufficient income can be generated to sustain it, present big challenges. Proposals now being developed by the Project Group for consultation will, if the community hub project goes ahead, significantly affect the accommodation of our library within the building. A clear, strong voice from the Friends is needed to protect the library and its role at the heart of a community hub which truly reflects what the community wants.

Doors open from 6.30pm and the formal business of the meeting will commence at 7.00pm. The quorum for the AGM is 15 members, but it is essential for as many members as possible to attend. The agenda will be provided at the meeting. Your annual membership is due for renewal in March, unless you joined for the first time at or after the 2013 Winter Fair. A form is enclosed with this newsletter or you can get one at the AGM. Please bring a cheque or cash if you haven't already renewed. Alternatively you can renew on our website. Thank you.

The Constitution calls for the four officers and up to eight other committee members to be elected at the AGM, with the possibility of two further co-options during the year. There are currently only nine of us, including one officer co-opted halfway through the year. Though we have facilitated many enjoyable and successful events, and represented you (our members) at various meetings and working groups, we could have used more help. Many hands make light work.

New committee members needed. If you are interested in the library and want to help ensure its future, do consider joining us (see separate article below). Nomination forms for election, either as an officer or as an ordinary committee member, can be collected beforehand from the Friends' Red Tray in the library, or on the night. If committee meetings are not for you, there are other ways you can assist and we keep a register of supporters.

The AGM is our main opportunity for members to gather to celebrate our achievements, to form and confirm policy and to decide the programme for the coming year. Do join us for wine and snacks from 6.30. The meeting will start at 7pm sharp. Be there and have your say.

Consultation coming soon...your views wanted

The Friends are a key member of the Project Group, which aims to keep the building in the public domain, and in use as a community asset. The PG is working on a business plan that includes some commercially rented spaces in the building, to generate vital income to cover its upkeep, while retaining the library, plus some space for community activities. The PG expects shortly to receive two reports from firms who were briefed last autumn: (1) a Conservation Plan, which will indicate the limits of what changes might be made; and (2) an Options Appraisal, showing alternative possibilities for the site (it will also mention any options ruled out). The next step is **public consultation**, with full display of alternatives, and plenty of opportunity for everyone to meet and question the professionals, and to discuss the whole proposal. The reports themselves will be available, in the Library and online.

Winter Fair: Andrew's Scottish Follies

The Friends' popular Winter Fair was held on Saturday 30th November 2013. Much thought went into the theme and title, after Ceres Dandridge, our marvellous 'creative director' for the past decade, had to stand down for health reasons. In the end, the date provided inspiration. 30th November being St Andrew's Day we decided to give the Fair a Scottish theme, in honour of our benefactor Andrew Carnegie. The royal blue and white of St Andrew's cross (the Scottish flag or Saltire) were used around the library, in bunting and balloons. The flag also made a simple but effective poster.



The coming of Christmas was also marked, by a lovely big Christmas tree – a ten foot Nordmann fir supplied (at a very generous discount) by Dulwich Pot & Plant Garden, Red Post Hill. All stalls did well – notably the Friends' refreshments – resulting in a record take for the Friends of just over £1,100. The trading stalls contributed £150 to that total. Several traders expressed a wish to return and we shall be happy to see them; although if stalls are oversubscribed, the aim must be to have as much variety as possible. Our VIP this time was the Mayor of Lambeth, Councillor Mark Bennett, who drew the Raffle as well as taking time to tour the rooms and meet people. We were also very pleased that Susanna Barnes, head of libraries, found time to drop by and see the library thronged by locals (including some trying to use the normal service!) Thanks to both Mark and Sue.

The Fair was voted one of our best ever. Lead organiser was Sue Beynon, who stepped in to run the Events sub-committee. Sue, Bob Goodrick and Jackie Plumridge, did a splendid job. Following our request letter, new volunteers were recruited to help on the day, which undoubtedly helped the event run smoothly.

ANNIVERSARIES in 2014

This year will see major commemorations of the start of World War I in August 1914. Why not borrow some books on aspects of the history of that conflict. There are also several literary birthdays to note, particularly Marlowe and Shakespeare (1564), Sheridan Le Fanu and Aubrey Thomas De Vere (1814), William Burroughs, Marguerite Duras, Laurie Lee, Dylan Thomas, Patrick O'Brian and Bernard Malamud (1914).

The Marquis de Sade died in 1814. Ambrose Bierce disappeared, presumed dead in 1914; and Alain Fournier was killed in action that year. Other deaths to note: Nathaniel Hawthorne and John Clare (1864), Brendon Behan, Rachel Carson, Ian Fleming and T H White (1964).

Birthdays of notable people in other fields include Galileo (1564), Richard Strauss (1864) and Sir Alec Guinness (1914). Charlemagne died in 814 and El Greco in 1614.

Make a point of seeking books and/or recordings and films by and about these notable people; remember them and be inspired by their lives.
