## **CARNEGIE LIBRARY COMMUNITY HUB PROJECT**

The Friends are a member of the community hub Project Group. The PG is working with Lambeth towards a mutual goal of a viable (self-sufficient) community hub that retains the library at its core, but also generates vital revenue to cover upkeep of the building. All going well, the building will be transferred from Lambeth to a new community entity, probably a charitable trust, at some future date. The PG continues to gather contacts with tenants and residents groups, housing associations, local interest groups and individuals who have expressed interest.

Currently under way is the important stage of an Options Appraisal by architects and other relevant professionals of the entire building. This is no-holds-barred study of what is possible and what is practicable. The outcome of the appraisal will be a set of different Options for everyone to consider and discuss, during a period of consultation next year. The Options Appraisal Brief is on Lambeth's website. ### Bat walk in Ruskin Park

Bat fun day on Saturday 3 August ended with a crowd of around 60 adults and children gathering for a bat walk, led by Dr Iain Boulton, Lambeth parks and ecology officer. Iain explained why bats only emerge just before dawn and at dusk (birds gone, so insects available), and told us the sounds to listen for on the bat detectors. On cue, those noises began to emanate from the little black boxes. People with good eyesight spotted around a dozen of the furry creatures flying, mostly across the ponds, where insects were plentiful. Both Common and Soprano Pipistrelles were seen. A very enjoyable evening, in the park 'after hours'.



### **Tracing the history of your Herne Hill house** A Lambeth Heritage Festival talk.

It was standing room only when over 100 turned up for this talk on 4 September by Alan Piper of The Brixton Society and Len Reilly of Lambeth Archives. With plenty of slides, they told the story of Herne Hill's development as a suburb, and took questions. Wine and nibbles were provided by the Friends.

If you would like to learn more about the 'middle class' housing built following the coming of the railways in the late Victorian and Edwardian era, Herne Hill is one of the areas chosen by author Helen C. Long to illustrate her book *The Edwardian House: the middle class home in Britain 1880-1914*. With many photographs, including details of doors and windows, etc., it can be borrowed from Carnegie Library.


