# SAVE OUR LIBRARY

- 1. In recent interviews with the *South London Press* the Leader of Lambeth Council, Councillor Steve Reed, announced that he had not been able to get the council's ruling Labour Group to agree over closing any libraries in the financial year starting on 1<sup>st</sup> April 2011.
- 2. Said that he expects "some" libraries will nevertheless be closed and implied that this will be done shortly after the end of that financial year in March 2012.
- 3. Said that he is looking for a decision by June 2011 on which libraries will be closed.
- 4. Confirmed that the Carnegie is one of the candidates for closure.

Your committee view the current situation as very serious but not hopeless and we are determined to stay open. By the time you read this we will have already taken important preliminary steps in this respect.

The briefing on the next page gives some details of what is probably afoot. Please do as many as possible of the following:

# Briefing

## Some simple sums

Lambeth disclose very few details of their finances and there are major inconsistencies in the figures they do supply.

A recent report to a committee that should be scrutinising the council's finances mentions that there will continue to be an Assistant Divisional Director of Universal Services employed in the Children and Young People's Department at a cost of  $\pounds 200,000$  a year. However, in future he or she will be paid out of the new schools' budget, presumably because Lambeth is not building or planning to build any new schools and there is therefore spare money in this particular budget. The cost of running our library is unlikely to be more than  $\pounds 200,000$ .

We can be pretty sure that the council is not taking on a politically embarrassing fight with library lovers just to save the running costs of the libraries threatened with closure.

After implementing the cuts in the council's expenditure already agreed by the Labour Group, Lambeth estimate that they will need to find a further £28 million over the next three years and they are selling property to fill this hole in the council's finances. The main financial reason for closing the library would be to sell it, including the back garden, for conversion to flats. As some of us recall, sale of the Carnegie for redevelopment was proposed in the council's Property Performance Report to the Audit Commission published in 2009.

On the understanding that Lambeth would pay the cost of running the library, Andrew Carnegie donated the cost of the building to provide a library for the people of Herne Hill. There is now an attempt to sell the Carnegie to raise money for a purpose which has little to do with the local community and nothing whatsoever to do with libraries.

## **Other Libraries**

There are ten public libraries left in Lambeth following a round of closures a decade ago. Until recently, there were plans to reopen two of the closed libraries but these appear to have been quietly dropped.

**Brixton Library** seems likely to be retained in its existing form for the foreseeable future. Clapham Library is due to be replaced by a multi-purpose building in November and there are vague proposals to do something similar with Streatham Library.

**Upper Norwood Joint Library** is co-owned by Lambeth and Croydon and the two boroughs continue to fund it while pursuing plans to close their own libraries.

**West Norwood Library** is housed in a persistently neglected 1960s local authority building. Decades of rainwater penetration through the flat roof and into the reinforced concrete walls appear to have rendered it beyond economic repair and it may soon be in danger of collapsing. There might be a possibility of creating a library in part of the adjacent Nettlefold Halls.

Cllr Reed has confirmed that the **Durning Library**, which is at Kennington Cross, **Minet Library**, which is near Myatt's Fields, and **Waterloo Library** are all candidates for closure. It is not clear whether he was asked about **Tate South Lambeth Library**.

With the exception of the Joint Library, all of Lambeth's libraries are housed either in buildings donated by benefactors or in buildings provided by the council in substitution for donated library buildings, when the council took donated buildings for other purposes.

Until late in the life of the last government there was a national standard that councils should provide sufficient libraries for everyone to be within one mile of a library. Lambeth achieved this except in the South of the borough. There now seem to be attempts to argue that the library network in the rest of the borough should be thinned out to match the South. Applying this reasoning would eventually mean closing all the borough's libraries and there have already been suggestions that Lambeth residents should travel to Westminster, Southwark or Wandsworth libraries.

The Friends' groups of Lambeth's libraries clearly need to work together to avoid their libraries being picked off one by one. I am encouraging them to do this.

## Not all gloom

The case for keeping the Carnegie and the other Lambeth libraries open is strong. We do have supporters in the council's Labour Group and this includes some members of Lambeth's Cabinet.

A key argument is that libraries provide computers and internet access locally, as well as books and a wide range of learning activities, for people who could not otherwise afford these. A list of the regular activities at the Carnegie is on the reverse of the accompanying flyer.
