

LIBRARY AND COMMUNITY HUB

Further to our July issue, there are two strands to Lambeth's strategy – redesign (or 'codesign') of its library service, and development of community hubs.

Library Service co-design. Progress on 'co-design' has been slower than planned as officials have recognised the need to treat each library separately, in its own community. There is little evidence so far that 'local communities' want to be involved in running their libraries; however the Council is forced to put in place measures for a viable library service within the greatly reduced budget. There is also concern about the Council's decision to safeguard three 'full service' libraries at Brixton, Streatham and the new 'Clapham One' (they will continue to be centrally managed and funded). Those decisions are not popular in some quarters but they are council policy, decided by the Cabinet, and there is not a lot that can be done about them now. At Carnegie Library we users must now work together with staff and officers to make the most of what we have, so as to keep our library open and, all going well, improve the service.

Our main obstacle is the swingeing budget cut. On the other hand, there are positives -

- Lambeth's old library service model has been torn up with the intention of making library improvements, and not just cost-cutting. The new acting head of Libraries, Olivia Spencer, has many years' experience of running (and turning around) library services elsewhere in the UK. Olivia is currently drafting a new service plan. Dare we say 'Things Can Only Get Better'?
- Books. Cost savings need not spell fewer books if other costs, for example central costs, can be pruned. In this connection please note that books in good condition can now be donated. Our library services manager Caroline Mackie is happy to receive donations of books obviously not every book offered will be needed for the library, but if you do offer a book, you can direct what should happen to it (eg returned to you) if not required.
- Opening hours. Our library's appalling opening hours have been disastrous in terms of attracting users, and consequently in terms of investment by Lambeth. Now, however, the Council's plan to develop the building as a community hub, if successful, will certainly transform the opening hours of the building. This, combined with self-service machines for book borrowing, should mean enhanced hours for library users even without any additional staffing.

Community Hub. As with the library service co-design, progress towards community hubs is slower than the Council had anticipated. Again, different communities have responded in their own ways – one size does not fit all. So far, the Friends have joined in setting up a small preliminary project group (which usefully includes two Councillors). This group is exploring with the Council the possible shape of a community hub organisation at Carnegie Library. The project group will shortly invite expressions of interest in the hub from a wide range of local groups and individuals. Public meetings will follow.

RECENT EVENT

RETURN TO THE BATS and "myembrace"





Last August (2011), the Events Sub-Committee was feeling very uncertain of success for the first Bat Fun Day, although a superb poster by Robert, our favourite designer, looked so inviting. In the end, the event turned out very well, but the same forebodings recurred this year, increased by the fact that there was no money for free food and gifts to ensure a good turn-out. This time the event, on 4th August, was to be shared with the Friends of Ruskin Park and "myembrace" who were making a study of Ruskin Park with them. There was to be a refresher display about the life and likings of bats at the Library, a poetry workshop in the Park, and a bat walk in the evening with Dr Iain Boulton, Lambeth's ecology officer; and every opportunity for things to go wrong, we muttered gloomily...And Robert had done such a lovely poster, based on last year's, in beautiful evening colours...

And, of course, everything went like a breeze, an unexpected and very nice breeze...smelling faintly of duck-ponds.

People did come to refresh their knowledge of bats, and our choice of poems and pictures was approved as a stimulus for creative writing. When it was time to go to the Park for the poetry workshop, the Library garden was looking so lovely that the poetry-writers decided to stay there; so, while some visitors scuttled off in case they might be asked to get creative about bats, nine brave adults and three very talented children sat round a garden table and had a very erudite and interesting session which they hardly wanted to end.

Having gone home for tea and woollies, thirty-nine adults and ten children ventured into the Park at dusk, armed with bat-detectors which emitted all sorts of odd noises as Iain taught the children to use them for all sorts of purposes, serious and silly...

And then, as we were straggling round the large pond, cooing over the tiny ducklings which were so tiny that they had to leap into the air when they wanted to dive, piercing the surface of the water with faint splashes, we really picked up the machine-gun sound of the bat-detectors, and saw twice as many bats as we saw last year - all of nine!!!

Iain kindly let us out at the nearest gates to our homes, and we went cheerfully home. Another successful day for the bats!






RECENT EVENT - YOUR SHOUT!

The BBC World Service has broadcast a heart-warming story from Manila in the Philippines, where Hernando Guanlao has set up an informal library outside his home. Readers can take as many books as they want, for as long as they want. Filipinos - certainly those who are not particularly wealthy - have limited access to books. To buy a book there, the average price is about 300 pesos (£4.50) and imported books (especially children's books) can easily be twice that amount. Guanlao gave up his job to run the library.

'Outreach service'. To help the poorest communities in Manila, 'Nanie' Guanlao does not wait for them to find him - he goes to them, on his 'book bike', which has a large basket piled high with books.

Note. Despite such poverty, the Philippines has one of the highest literacy rates in the developing world. Approximately 93% of the population 10 years of age and older are literate
