

A CO-OPERATIVE LIBRARY?

On Monday 9th July the Lambeth Cabinet approved council proposals for:

- Continuation of library service in all Lambeth libraries, despite heavy cuts to the library budget.
- Some other council services, and community activities where appropriate, to be located in certain of the library buildings, including Carnegie; in these places the library building will become a 'community hub'.
- Capital investment in library buildings estimated at £6 million (depending on asset sales) over the next 4 years.
- 7-day opening in Brixton, Clapham One (the new library) and Streatham.
- New technologies to include borrower self-service machines, and wi-fi.
- Revenue savings (ie budget cut) of £750,000 over the current year and next year. This cuts the total spend on libraries to £4.037 million in 2012-2013 and £3.637 million in 2013-2014.
- The allocation of these cuts between libraries, using a 'needs based' method. Under the method selected Herne Hill scores the lowest points, so Carnegie is rated as the least 'needy' library, and therefore suffers the biggest budget cut down from £213,000 in 2011-2012 to £128,000 in 2012-2013 and £110,000 in 2013-2014 (thus almost halved).
- Developing the 'hub' libraries including Carnegie 'in partnership with the local community'.

What do we make of all this? The good news is that Lambeth Council, having consulted residents, has listened and (unlike many other Councils) accepted the principle of keeping libraries open. For this the Council deserves our praise. No library is closing, though there may be some local relocation. Other good news is that capital proceeds from asset sales are to be 'ring fenced' for library buildings.

The bad news is the operational cuts – nearly 50% in the case of Carnegie. It is hard to see how any 'efficiency drive' can make up for such a severe reduction. The Co-operative Libraries report now approved by Cabinet says 'the existing model of [library] service delivery is unsustainable and will cease'. The new service model will be 'co-designed and co-produced' by communities, library users, non-users and library staff. The report goes on to say 'It is likely that a patchwork of community-led arrangements will evolve across the borough, which will require the Council to mould itself around by providing tailor-made support'.

The next stage is a series of co-design meetings between Council officers and local stakeholders during July and August, with a view to a further (progress) report to Cabinet in September.

So now we face a step in the dark. Can a poor library service be 'modernised' into a good one, while having its budget cut in half? Quite simply, that is the challenge.

Footnote. This event is part of Brixton-based Embrace Co-operation's 'Lost Stories of Ruskin Park' project. This year-long project, aided by the Heritage Lottery Fund, aims to increase awareness of the historic and natural heritage of Ruskin Park and the local area surrounding the park. Activities include recording interviews with local people who have memories of the park; researching the park's history with the help of Lambeth Archives, and increasing awareness of John Ruskin and his writings. 
